

The Sun Sets on the 2014 U.S. Open

Sunset over the Pacific Ocean at Laguna Beach, California, served as the backdrop for the Bowls USA Open awards banquet, the culmination of six days of bowling scattered across seven venues in Orange County, California. Competing in Singles, Pairs and Fours, 80 women and 177 men from ten different countries battled not only each other, but record-breaking heat.

The week began on the evening of September 13, 2014, with the Opening Ceremony and Welcome Party. A bagpiper led the Bowls USA board members and counselors onto the greens at Laguna Woods LBC. Mert Isaccman, chairman of the Open, served as Master of Ceremonies and welcomed all the bowlers. After introductions, a light buffet dinner with drinks afforded the bowlers a chance to reunite with friends before meeting the next day as competitors.

Sunday saw the tournament begin in earnest with the start of approximately 600 different games. Each was a two-day event with seven flights, giving bowlers a chance to advance, even with a loss or two.

Hollywood, and a break from the heat, came mid-week to the tournament. The red carpet was rolled out for the bowlers as they walked into the Hollywood Review, "The Glitz and Glam of it All," held at the Crown Plaza Hotel on Wednesday evening in Costa Mesa, Calif. After walking the red carpet bowlers had instant photos taken in a photo booth, and then it was on to dining, drinking and dancing the evening away. As one international attendee said, "This party is the best ever of all the very many we have attended throughout our world bowling experience."

"Best ever," seemed to be a continuing theme throughout the tournament as bowlers from outside the U.S. soaked up the Southern California sunshine, friendliness and laid-back attitude. Steve Halmai of Australia said, "This is my second year attending the Open. It's an easy-going atmosphere, like family. More like a carnival than a tournament."

Glen Lyon, also from Australia, commented "It's great to play with international players. The volunteers and hospitality are excellent; a real strong point"

Australia was well represented at the Open with Glen Lyon, Steve Halmai, Ian Taylor, Greg Moss, Frank Vogel, Frank Vella, David Cameron and Graeme Kath all competing.

Raymond Barr, the Men's Singles Champion, said, "This is my 6th year in a row coming to the U.S. Open. I've enjoyed every single year; won a couple of flights, but today was extra special to be the U.S. Open Singles Champion! A big thank you to all the friends we've made over the years."

Players from the U.K, including Joe McLaney and Raymond Barr, both from Scotland, as well as David Du-Bois and David Hamilton from Northern Ireland all played together. "It's a magnificent time," McLaney said. "Thank everyone who expertly ran the tournament,"

Saturday, September 20, was Grand Finals day filled with comradery and championships. Located on a cliff, overlooking the Pacific Ocean, Laguna Beach LBC is the ideal venue for the final rounds. The activities started early with the men's and women's Pairs Championships, followed by the Singles and finally the Fours. Spectators lined the green while gulls flew overhead, waves crashed below and tourists stopped on the sidewalk to look over the hedges.

After the last bowl was rolled in the last championship game it was time to hand out the medals to all the finalists, followed by a hearty buffet dinner. Bowlers and their guests dined on the green while a gentle breeze swayed the palm trees and the sun slowly set over the ocean. The Open ended with promises to e-mail and to "see you next year!"

Mert Isaccman, chairman of the U.S. Open for the last four years, passed the mantle on to Phil Luth who will take over the job for 2015. The dates for the 2015 U.S. Open are tentatively set for September 30 – October 7 in Southern California. Registration begins in the summer and you can register on the <u>U.S. Open website</u>. The U.S. Open will be held in Florida in 2016 and 2017.

Frick Park Lawn Bowling Club is the only public club in the North East Division responsible for maintaining its greens. Though located on public park property since being founded in 1938, the members have borne the costs of equipment, materials and labor since 1992, when the financially strapped city threatened to shut down the club. The bulk of dues coming from about 60 members are directed towards keeping the greens fit for bowling.

All this work makes our greens among the most beautiful in the region (and we have lights to play at night!). But it also means we have to find creative ways to keep greens maintenance funding going strong. And so we've marketed our club to outside groups — whether they're businesses, corporations, non-profit organizations or social clubs looking for a unique kind of outing — we've found a way to make these events income-generators for our club.

But at the same time, as club president Richard Lockyer explains, "these outings are also a great way to share lawn bowling with people who have never tried the sport before, and in some cases, have had such a good time, they become members themselves." The club has harnessed the power of social media to get the word out about the greens' availability for corporate outings, as well as used posters, word of mouth and its website to spread the word.

Finally, t-shirts and hats are another way to add to the club's funds and also market the team in and around the city. "If I'm wearing one of our t-shirts, someone will frequently ask me about the club or the greens, it's been a great way to advertise the sport," Lockyer adds.



Callison: Lawn Bowling a Growing Hit in Mitchell

Mitchell— When Rod Titze was a boy, he would watch his father and other adults compete in a tantalizing sport forbidden to children.

In the 1950s, and for 30 years before and after that decade, lawn bowling was only for men, you see. Women and children couldn't participate. Only manly men rolled the oddly shaped balls toward a smaller ball, know as the jack, each vying to see whose ball would quit rolling nearest the mark.

Titze overcame his youthful disappointment, grew to manhood and moved away. When he returned to Mitchell in 1986, other things demanded his attention. In 1992, the bowling green, a fixture at Hitchcock Park in southeastern Mitchell since the 1920s was torn up and replaced by a tennis court.

City fathers promised to build a new bowling green, but it never happened. Years passed, but while a collective city memory may fade, lawn bowlers never forgot. In 2007, a "dream team" committee from Mitchell Senior Citizens Inc. proposed bringing back a bowling green.

The city parks had no interest, Titze says, but the golf department director did. And so a new bowling green was developed at Lakewood Golf Course, north of Mitchell.

"It's been a hit," says Titze. In 2011 its first full summer of operation, 1, 353 people participated. In 2012, that rose to 1,642, and this year's records show the Lakeview Lawn Bowling Association is on pace to top 2013's attendance of 1, 704.






